The school management would like to sincerely thank you all for joining the Friends of Firoda for the current year. Due to circumstances beyond our control we were slow to get it up and running this year and as such were a little behind. The project runs from Sept. to June to tie in with the school year and so to keep ourselves up to date we held 4 draws on the one evening in December. (September, October, November and December draws) The next draw will be held on Friday 28th. January in the school at 2.45p.m.

As you know the Friends of Firoda is the schools main source of income for the year so without your support we would find it very difficult to operate. Approximately £3500 is received from the Department each year as a Capitation grant. About another £5000 has to be found to keep the show on the road. A local Contribution of approx. £600 is made by the parish (£10 per pupil to all primary schools in the parish) so the rest has to be fundraised.
