Castlecomer Demesne is located at the edge of the town and encompassed Castlecomer House, home of the Wandesforde family. They established a unique and ornate haven within the estate walls but down through the years as a result of years of neglect, the Demesne has returned to nature, becoming totally overgrown with heavy undergrowth and brambles.



These were once a beautiful set of steps, but like everything else in the Demesne today, they too have fallen victim to the under growth and years of neglect.

Today, Castlecomer Demesne covers an area of approximately 150 acres. A point named the 'Twelve Views', which offers a panoramic vista across the surrounding countryside, the remnants of the two boating lakes, man made caves and the derelict Ardra Castle provide historical focal points of the Demesne. The 'Scarp Drive' exposes the rock character and creates for the visitor a visual link between the past and present.

Castlecomer Demesne was also the venue for a series of art projects during the summer/autumn of 2000. Artists and sculptors worldwide came to the Demesne and produced many fine works of art. Here are some examples of the sculptures:

Demesne Re-development - 2004
